## NO KNOWLEDGE OF GOD'S WORD

### LESSON THREE

## INTRODUCTION:

It is only natural that we try as best we can to determine why some things happen as they do. At the same time we are just as eager to escape any responsibility for conditions and circumstances in which we so often find ourselves. We place the blame on "they", whoever "they" may be. Our boy could not be at fault, but the other boy is the guilty one, and responsible for the whole sordid affair. In this lesson we want to suggest some basic cause for juvenile delinquency as it is today.

- A. The basic cause is that our young people have no knowledge of God.

  This will go for most parents too. In <u>Hosea 4:6</u> we read, "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge; because thou has rejected knowledge, I will also reject thee, thou shalt be no priest to me: seeing thou has forgotten the law of thy God, I will also forget thy children."

  Three things suggested in this verse:
  - 1. The people were destroyed. "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge."
  - 2. God rejected those who had rejected him. "I will reject thee, that thou shalt be no priest to me."
    - a. Place, office, honor, opportunities of usefulness, will be taken from us if we misuse them. Revelation 2:5.
  - 3. The children were lost through the unfaithfulness of their parents.
    "I will forget thy children."
- B. Failure of parents to shoulder their responsibility and to lead the children in right religious training, another cause in the field of juvenile delinquency. Many parents spend their time:

1. In having Sunday morning breakfast parties; Sunday noon picnics; Sunday night shows.

2. Others at Sunday night dances, card parties, and drinking bouts.

- 3. These same parents blame the preachers, Bible school teachers, and the whole church for not doing a better job in teaching their children.
- C. Building on the sand the most insidious and devastating peril to American youth. See Matthew 7:24-29.
  - 1. To build on the sand is to build one's house without the Word of God as the foundation of that house.

## THE HOT-ROD: ITS INFLUENCE ON AMERICAN YOUTH

## IESSON FIVE

## INTRODUCTION:

What is often referred to as the "roaring twenties" would not make one little "pip-squeak" compared with the "roaring fifties" of the 'hot-rod' and the 'chicken' age. The "hot-rod" car in the hands of undisciplined American youth has been the cause for many juvenile delinquents who otherwise might have been normal, right-thinking boys. Most of the area around our high schools of today is so cluttered with "hot-rods" and other cars that it is exceedingly dangerous for one to try to negotiate his way through the area of such schools. Mr. William Condit says, "High school boys are joy-riding right out of an education." Hear Mr. Condit:

- 1. Sammy makes his car run and it plays havoc with his grades.
- 2. His stock may go up with the girls when he gets a car, but his grades are sure to go down.
- 3. He may quit school, or at least quit athletics, to get a job so he can keep the car going.
- 4. Idahd survey of students revealing:
  - a. Not a single straight-A student owned a car.
  - b. 15% of the B students owned cars.
  - c. 41% of the C students owned cars.
  - d. 71% of the D students owned cars.
  - e. 83% of failing students owned cars. (Nashville Tennessean. 2/13/59)

Usually people do not take seriously any amount of warning that may be given concerning some impending danger. The twenty-two hundred and twenty-three people who were riding the Titanic thought they were riding an "unsinkable" ship, so warnings of icebergs in the vicinity of the ship went unheeded. About midnight, April 15, 1912, a great iceberg struck the big ship with such force as to rip her side wide open. Within two hours fifteen hundred and seventeen of those people were drowned in the icy waters of the North Atlantic. Some of them no doubt would have been saved had the repeated warnings been heeded. Throughout the nation and in most every press of the nation, America and American parents are being warned of the tragedy that is sure to come as the result of an undisciplined populace among the youth of the land. Hear some of these warnings:

Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, Director Federal Bureau of Investigation:

"We must choose between DISCIPLINE AND BARBARISM."

Suggested causes for juvenile crime:

1. A lack of respect for property on the part of many young people.

2. A lack of respect for authority as reflected in scores of headlines.

## HOW TO MAKE DELINQUENTS

### LESSON SEVEN

## INTRODUCTION:

Most of our discussion, up to this point, has concerned some reasons why there is so much juvenile delinquency abroad in the land. As we come to this part of our course, it would be wise to point out some things that will, if all others fail, certainly make and produce the largest and most dangerous group of juvenile delinquents that the world has ever known. This formula is infallible. Consider the following:

- 1. Be sure that you do not give your children any religious training. By your example teach him to ignore the Word of God and neglect to assemble at the meetings of the church.
- 2. Be sure that you take good care of his material-bodily needs.
- 3. In your child's presence:
  - a. Don't be respectful of womanhood. Belittle "dames".
  - b. Be sure to belittle the law and government.
  - c. Speak disrespectfully of the police and all public officials.
  - d. Speak disparagingly of the school and all the teachers.
  - e. Talk, in an ugly spirit, about the church, preacher, elders, deacons, Bible school teachers, and any or all of the members.
- 4. Be sure to humiliate your child in the presence of friends. He is sure to lose his respect for you.
- 5. Refuse to have any constructive discipline. Disagree with your wife or husband in the presence of the child. Let the parents "fight it out" in the presence of the child so the child will know who is "boss".
- 6. Be sure to criticize departed guests in the presence of the children.
- 7. Do not open up your home to the companions of the children; they will simply muss up the place. The house is too hard to clean up. Get the brats out in the street to play. Never be concerned about where or with whom the children spend their free time.
- 8. Be sure that your home does not become the center of cheer.
  - a. Make it a dumping ground for your grouches and pet peeves.
  - b. The father and mother in the home should growl, spit at, fuss and verbally fight with each other.
- 9. If the above methods do not make your child a delinquent, try the following:
  - a. Be sure to forget the promises that you make to your children.
  - b. Let the children know that they have no sense of appreciation.
  - c. Never praise your child for his worthwhile effort.
  - d. Be a poor example yourself.
